Running smoothly, at last...

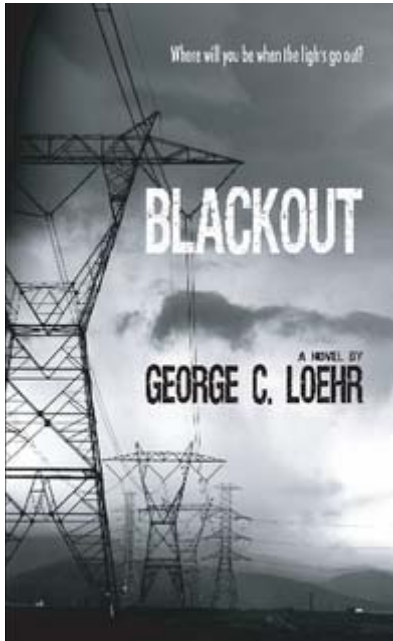

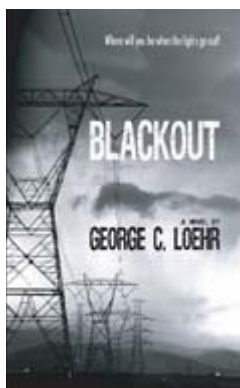

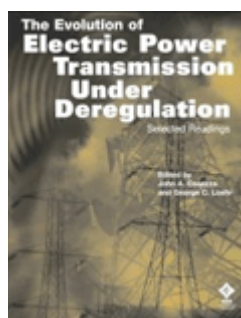
